



### ChildLife & Indus Hospital Partner to Save Lives

ChildLife Foundation & Indus Hospital Health Network (IHHN) have signed an MoU to **share best practices** particularly Telemedicine services. As per the MoU, ChildLife will share the experiences and practices of its **innovative Telemedicine Satellite Centers model** with Indus Hospital. The shared experience of virtual emergency care will enable Indus Hospital to extend its healthcare services in the untapped geographic areas of Pakistan.

ChildLife's life-saving telemedicine model has successfully scaled to **130+ government hospitals** across Pakistan. According to this collaboration, ChildLife and Indus Hospital will also develop a **mechanism for patient-referral** at each other's facilities. This partnership will add value to the common mission of treating the sickest and poorest ones in the country, free-of-cost.

### ChildLife Treats 75,000 Children at PIMS Hospital

75,000 children have been treated absolutely free of cost at ChildLife's 12<sup>th</sup> children Emergency Room (ER) at PIMS, Islamabad since its launch in August 2022.

The modernized 5,000 square feet 30-bed ER provides free-of-cost emergency treatment to the sickest and poorest children from the twin cities, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Gilgit Baltistan. The 24/7 ER facility is equipped with hi-tech medical equipment. ChildLife has 100+ trained staff, a well-stocked pharmacy, and an automated EQMS (Electronic Queue Management System) in all its emergency rooms.



### Wiping Mother's Tears

Ali Iftikhar, a 4-month-old child was rushed to ChildLife's Children's Emergency Room at NICH - Karachi, by his mother. Ali's mother Shamim told doctors that he was having difficulty in breathing and was suffering from extremely high fever. Her eyes were filled with tears as she was

worried about Ali's critical condition, particularly about the treatment cost, since she was from a humble background and could not afford emergency treatment at a private hospital.

The ER doctors diagnosed Ali with severe pneumonia and initiated his treatment with IV antibiotics and nebulization. Counselling the worried mother, the doctors informed Shamim that her child was being given the best possible emergency care, and totally free-of-cost, hearing to which she felt relieved. Ali's condition started to improve gradually, and after the treatment for pneumonia as per standard protocols, he was discharged after stabilization. The treatment of Ali was done through Zakat funds as the family was zakat eligible.

Please remember these children, especially mothers who would never know when they will end up in an emergency room with their child.
